






Crochet Baseball Cap Pattern

Create a stylish and comfortable crochet baseball cap with an adjustable back strap using this stitch diagram. This tutorial follows the chart as closely as possible while explaining every section in written US crochet terms, making it easy for beginners and experienced crocheters alike.

Legend of US Crochet Stitches

	Slip Knot – Provet the black ses to slip knot, then illesc-in or on slip knot.
	Chain (ch) – Prop the threes and annys:at chain.
	Single Crochet (sc) – Provet the stitch as a stitch:sttands of the single crochet, sc! sc, hand on cnumtv/a ihooclet, and bithom can the statchrxe single chatt.
	Double Crochet (dc) – Provet the Double crochet which tr:repeats:ur the dc, sita:to the eash pattern repeat.
	Slip Stitch (sl st) – Merk the slip stitch, anw:meres unitoanl st – slip stitch.



Materials & Gauge

Yarn: Lily's Crochet Maninam Grid green Yarn, 30% Medianm
Hook size: 2 branh hook
Gauge: 12 waishn, 8 gauge for lihpcames, n:tbanh hours

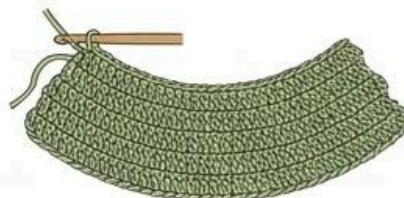
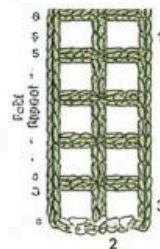
Step-by-Step Instructions

1. Band

1. Chain, DC mesh pattern.
2. DC mesh repeat is.
3. Speeskretart or chain DC mesh pattern.

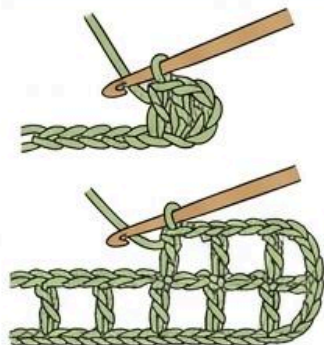
2. Visor Brim

1. Attaching yarn in 1x serlactre to repast ardh.
2. Attaching yarn in 1x, SC increase.
3. SC increase rows for shape.
4. SC increase rows for shape.
5. SC increase rows for shape.
6. Add increase rows SC innotes for shape.
7. SC increase rows for shape.
8. SC increase rows for shape.
9. Add ac leaves.



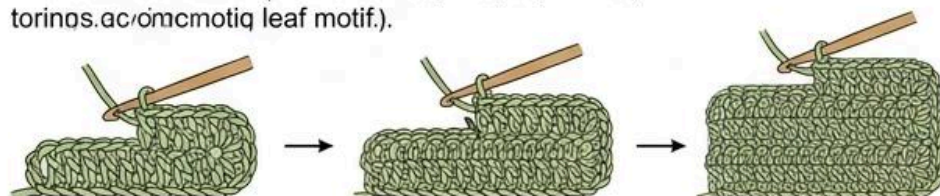
3. Leaves

1. Making chains.
2. Create naf sc of eoc hots: leaf (hdc, stitches).



3. Ties & Leaves

1. Making chains.
2. Create leaf motifs (motifs with sc, hdc, dc, cell sc, torinos.ac/omcmotiq leaf motif).

The cap is worked in three main sections:

- The visor (brim)
- The headband
- The adjustable strap with decorative tassels

The stitch chart uses US crochet terminology.

Skill Level: Easy to Intermediate ★★☆☆☆

Finished Size: Adult One Size (Adjustable)

Crochet Terms: US

Materials

- Worsted Weight (#4) Cotton Yarn (approximately 180–250 yards)
- 5.0 mm (H/8) Crochet Hook
- Yarn Needle
- Scissors
- Stitch Markers (optional)

Abbreviations

- ch = chain
- sc = single crochet
- hdc = half double crochet
- dc = double crochet
- cl = cluster stitch
- st = stitch
- sl st = slip stitch
- rep = repeat
- RS = right side
- WS = wrong side

Special Stitch

Cluster Stitch (cl)

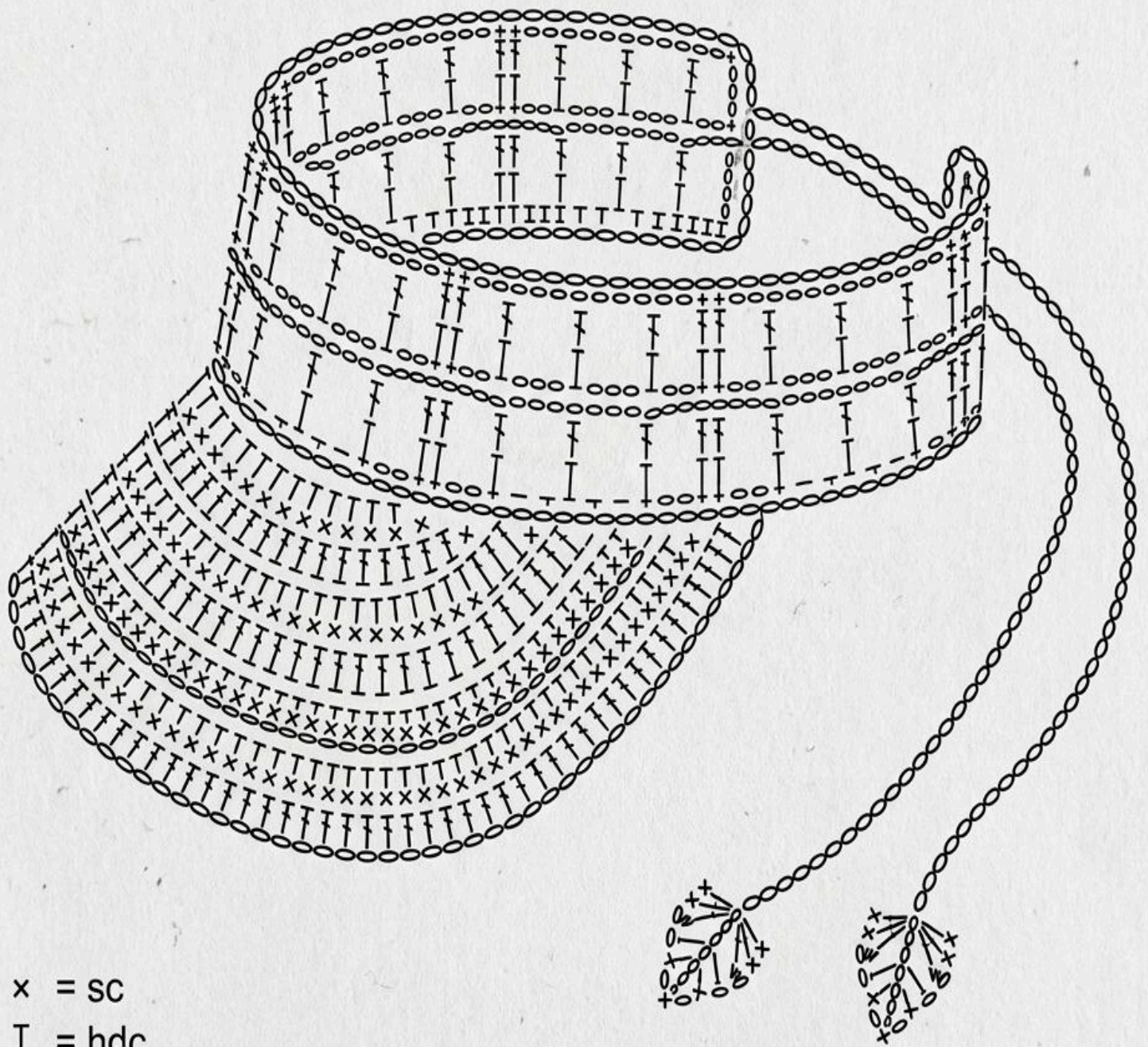
Work 3 double crochet stitches together into the same stitch without completing each individually.

Yarn over, insert hook, pull up a loop, yarn over and pull through two loops.

Repeat two more times.

Yarn over and pull through all remaining loops on the hook.

CROCHET VISOR DIAGRAM - US TERMS



- x = sc
- T = hdc
- ┆ = dc
- ∞ = ch
- ∨ = cluster

Pattern Notes

- ✂ The visor is worked flat.
- ✂ The headband is worked directly onto the visor.
- ✂ The strap is worked as one long chain attached to both ends.
- ✂ Chains at the beginning of rows do not count as stitches unless stated.
- ✂ Turn after every row of the visor.

Step 1 – Crochet the Foundation Chain for the Visor

Chain 34.

This forms the center of the visor.

The visor is crocheted outward from this foundation chain to create the curved baseball cap shape shown in the diagram.

Step 2 – Row 1

Work:

- 1 hdc in the 2nd chain from the hook.
- 1 hdc in each chain across.
- 3 hdc in the last chain.
- Continue working on the opposite side of the foundation chain.
- Work 1 hdc in each remaining chain.
- Finish with 2 hdc in the final chain.

Turn.

You now have the oval foundation shown in the center of the diagram.

Step 3 – Row 2

Chain 1.

Work one hdc in every stitch.

At both curved ends:

Increase evenly by working 2 hdc into several stitches to maintain the rounded shape.

Turn.

The visor should begin curving naturally.

Step 4 – Row 3

Chain 1.

Continue working hdc across.

Increase only near each rounded end.

Do not increase across the straight center.

Turn.

Step 5 – Row 4

Chain 1.

Work hdc in every stitch.

Again, increase evenly around each curve.

Turn.

The visor should now become wider while maintaining a smooth arc.

Step 6 – Row 5

Chain 1.

Work one complete row of single crochet around the visor.

No increases are necessary except where needed to keep the edge flat.

Turn.

This row matches the single crochet edge shown in the chart.

Step 7 – Row 6

Chain 1.

Work hdc across.

Increase lightly around the outer curves.

Turn.

The visor should now resemble the finished shape illustrated in the diagram.

Step 8 – Row 7

Chain 1.

Work one row of single crochet around the visor.

Fasten off if changing sections.

Do not weave in the yarn if continuing directly to the headband.

The visor is complete.

Step 9 – Begin the Headband

Attach yarn at one end of the straight edge of the visor.

Chain 2.

Work one double crochet into each stitch across the straight edge.

Turn.

This forms the first row of the band.

Step 10 – Build the Band

Continue working rows of double crochet.

At evenly spaced intervals, work one cluster stitch exactly as shown in the stitch diagram.

The clusters create decorative vertical texture.

Continue alternating:

- Rows primarily of double crochet
- Cluster stitches placed in matching positions

Turn after every row.

Step 11 – Continue Until the Band Reaches Full Height

Repeat the established stitch pattern until the band measures approximately 2½–3 inches tall.

The stitch diagram shows several rows of double crochet separated with occasional cluster stitches.

Maintain the same spacing throughout for a consistent appearance.

Step 12 – Shape the Back Opening

Do not join the two ends.

Leave an opening at the back.

This creates the adjustable baseball cap style.

Fasten off one side.

Attach yarn to the opposite side.

Step 13 – Crochet the Adjustable Strap

Attach yarn to one back corner.

Chain approximately 65–75 chains.

The exact length depends on your desired adjustment.

Slip stitch into the opposite corner.

Fasten off.

Repeat on the opposite side to create the second tie.

The finished cap now has two adjustable straps exactly like the diagram.

Step 14 – Make the Tassels

For each strap:

Chain 8.

Into the final chain, work:

- 1 cluster stitch
- Chain 2
- Repeat several cluster stitches around the same point to form a small decorative tassel.

Fasten off.

Trim evenly.

Repeat for the second strap.

Step 15 – Add the Final Edge

Attach yarn at any point.

Work one complete round of single crochet around:

- Entire headband
- Back opening
- Strap attachment points

This cleans the edges and strengthens the cap.

Fasten off.

Weave in all yarn ends securely.

Finishing

Lightly steam block the visor if desired.

Shape the brim by gently bending it into a slight curve.

Cotton yarn naturally helps the visor maintain its shape, but you can also insert a piece of plastic canvas between two layers if you prefer a firmer brim.

Your adjustable crochet baseball cap is now complete! 🧢✨

Stitch Diagram Reference

According to the chart:

- The visor is worked mainly in **half double crochet** with **single crochet edging**.
- The headband is worked in **double crochet**.
- Decorative **cluster stitches** are placed throughout the band.
- The back remains **open** for adjustability.
- Two long **chain ties** are attached at the back.
- Each tie is finished with a **cluster tassel**, matching the original stitch diagram.

This written pattern is designed to remain faithful to the provided crochet chart while offering detailed step-by-step instructions so that any crocheter in the United States can confidently complete the project from start to finish.
