






# Crochet Lace Visor Pattern – Step-by-Step Tutorial

Create a beautiful handmade lace visor with this detailed crochet tutorial based on the stitch diagram provided. This guide follows the chart as closely as possible while explaining every step in clear American crochet terminology, making it easy for beginners and experienced crocheters alike.

## Crochet Lace Visor Pattern

### Legend of Crochet Stitches

	<b>Chain (ch)</b> - Prop the three and anwast chain.
	<b>Single Crochet (sc)</b> Provet the stitch as a stitch:stands of the single.
	<b>Half Double Crochet (hdc)</b> Provet the half double Crochet chot.
	<b>Double Crochet (dc)</b> Provet the Double crochet which tr:repeats: x dc, sitto to the eash pattern repeat.
	<b>Cluster (cluster)</b> Merk the cluster stitch, wnich,meises unitoanit strt – slip stitch.



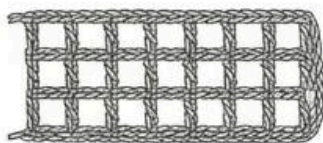
### Materials & Gauge

**Yarn:** Light grey cotton lace weight  
**Hook size:** E/3.5mm  
**Gauge:** 12 sc x 14 rows = 4"

### Step-by-Step Instructions

#### 1. Headband & Ties

1. Make the hdc band in 1x bamn to ch-2 oicners in the green.
2. The dc mesh section with ch -2 spaces with ch-2 spaces (menavaands, ntr:iot ficiter in me. trezing tram-1).
4. Prov for:ch-2 spaces.
5. The long chain ties.
6. Long chain ties with pom-pom-poms at 3x sparæs, and nattering chain ties with pom-poms.



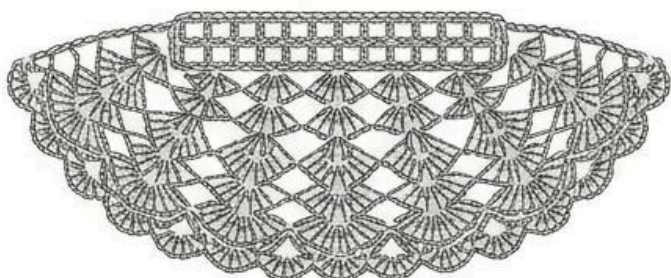
#### 2. Visor Brim

1. Work into the bottom edge of the headband. Following the chart in (mage 2).
2. Alternating cluster stitch, alternating cluster and shell stitches, shell stitches to create the an lax stitch, alternating cluster shell stitches – shell stitches to create the san stiche, as cluster as the shell stitches to create fan lace.



#### 3. Finishing

1. Weave in ends powemy.
2. Prove the hastand.
3. Shape amnn the pattern.
4. Add vive in the pattern and stiche when appearing the sah pattern.

**Skill Level:** Intermediate

**Finished Size:** Adult (One Size Fits Most)

The visor is worked in three main sections:

- The lace crown
- The solid headband
- The ties with decorative circles

American Crochet Terms (US)

## Abbreviations

- ch = chain
- sc = single crochet
- hdc = half double crochet
- dc = double crochet
- cluster = cluster stitch (explained below)
- sl st = slip stitch
- st = stitch
- sp = space
- rep = repeat

## Materials

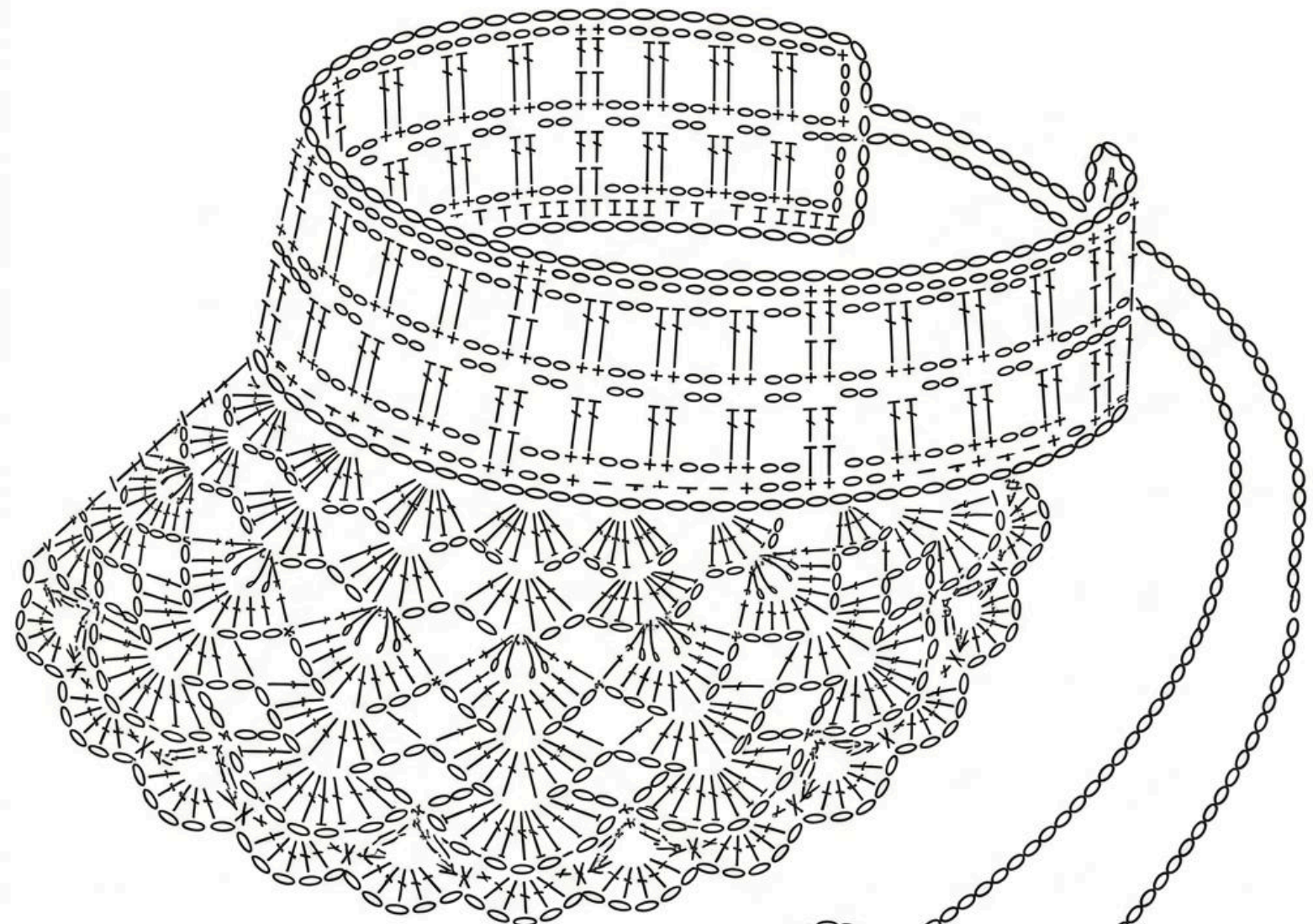
- Sport Weight (Fine #2) or DK Weight (#3) cotton yarn
- 3.5 mm (E) crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Stitch markers (optional)

## Gauge

Gauge is not critical for this project.

The lace naturally stretches and adjusts to fit comfortably.

## Special Stitch

### Cluster Stitch

The chart uses fan-shaped cluster stitches.

Work as follows:

Yarn over, insert hook into indicated stitch, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through two loops.

Repeat this process several times into the same stitch or space until multiple unfinished double crochets remain on the hook.

Yarn over and pull through all loops.

This creates one cluster.

## Construction Overview

The visor is crocheted from the bottom lace edge upward.

After completing the lace section, the headband is worked directly onto the top edge.

Finally, long ties are added to both ends and finished with decorative crochet circles.

## Starting Chain

Chain approximately 96.

The chain should be a multiple that comfortably fits around the head while allowing the lace repeat shown in the diagram.

Do not twist the chain.

Join with a slip stitch to form a ring.

## Round 1 – Foundation of the Lace

Chain 3.

This counts as the first double crochet.

Work the lace pattern following the chart:

- 1 cluster
- chain spaces
- double crochet posts
- repeat across the entire round

Finish by joining with a slip stitch into the top of the beginning chain.

The lace should begin forming small fan shapes.

## **Round 2 – Expanding the Fans**

Slip stitch into the first chain space.

Chain 3.

Work the next fan exactly as illustrated.

Each fan is built from:

- clusters
- double crochets
- chain spaces

Continue around.

The shells begin opening wider.

Join with a slip stitch.

## **Round 3 – Building the Open Lace**

Continue working directly into the chain spaces.

Each shell becomes larger.

The spaces between shells create the airy diamond design seen in the chart.

Maintain even tension throughout.

Join with a slip stitch.

## **Round 4 – Repeat the Lace Motif**

Repeat the previous round exactly.

Each shell stacks directly above the shell below.

The chain spaces remain aligned vertically.

The pattern now begins looking like layered scallops.

## **Round 5 – Full Lace Width**

Continue following the chart.

Each shell now reaches its widest point.

The clusters become the center of each decorative fan.

Keep every repeat identical.

Avoid tightening the chain spaces.

The lace edge should remain soft and flexible.

## **Round 6 – Completing the Lace Section**

Work the final lace repeat shown in the diagram.

Join the round.

The lower portion of the visor should now display several rows of overlapping shells with deep scalloped edges.

This completes the decorative body.

## **Transition to the Headband**

The chart now switches from lace stitches to solid stitches.

Slip stitch until reaching the top edge.

Begin working horizontal rows instead of expanding lace.

## **Headband Row 1**

Chain 2.

Work one hdc into every stitch around.

No increases.

Join with a slip stitch.

The edge becomes firm.

## Headband Row 2

Chain 2.

Work one hdc in every stitch.

Join.

This creates a smooth fabric that supports the visor.

## Headband Row 3

Repeat one hdc in every stitch.

The band gradually becomes stronger.

Keep the stitches even.

## Headband Row 4

Continue working hdc evenly around.

The solid band should now measure approximately 1 inch tall.

## Headband Row 5

Repeat the previous round.

Maintain the same stitch count.

The visor should now comfortably wrap around the head.

## Headband Row 6

Work another complete round of hdc.

The upper edge should appear perfectly straight.

## Headband Row 7

Repeat hdc around.

This finishes the solid headband shown in the chart.

Fasten off.

## Left Tie

Join yarn at one side of the band.

Chain approximately 90–110.

Adjust the length if a longer tie is preferred.

Fasten off.

## Right Tie

Repeat on the opposite side.

Both ties should be equal in length.

## Decorative Crochet Circle

Create a magic ring.

Round 1:

Work 16 dc into the ring.

Pull tightly closed.

Join with a slip stitch.

Fasten off leaving a tail.

Sew one circle onto the end of each tie.

These circles match the finishing detail shown in the diagram.

## Blocking

Lightly wet the visor.

Shape the lace evenly.

Pin the scallops into place.

Allow it to dry completely.

Blocking helps open the lace pattern and gives the visor its elegant appearance.

## Finishing

Weave in every yarn tail securely.

Inspect the headband for even tension.

Ensure both ties are identical in length.

Your lace visor is now complete.

The finished design features:

- A delicate scalloped lace body
- A comfortable solid headband
- Long adjustable ties
- Decorative crochet circles at each end
- Lightweight and breathable construction
- A feminine vintage-inspired style perfect for warm weather ☀️
