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# Ice Dragon Scarf Crochet Pattern (US Terms)



Create a stunning Ice Dragon Scarf featuring a sculpted dragon head, textured bobble scales, decorative picot spikes, and two snowflake pockets. This detailed pattern is based directly on the chart provided and is written in standard US crochet terminology.

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## Skill Level

Intermediate to Advanced

You should be comfortable with:

- Working in rows and rounds
- Single crochet decreases
- Half double crochet
- Double crochet
- Bobble stitches
- Picots
- Reading crochet diagrams
- Color changes

## Finished Size

Approximately:

- Length: 72–84 inches (183–213 cm)
- Width: 5–6 inches (13–15 cm)

Adjust length by adding or removing body rows.

## Materials

- Worsted Weight (#4) yarn
  - Main Color A: Ice Blue (approximately 400–500 yards)
  - Color B: White (approximately 150–200 yards)
- Crochet Hook: Size H/8 (5 mm)
- Yarn Needle
- Scissors
- Stitch Markers
- Safety Eyes (optional) or black yarn for embroidered eyes

## Abbreviations (US Terms)

- CH = Chain
- SL ST = Slip Stitch
- SC = Single Crochet
- HDC = Half Double Crochet
- DC = Double Crochet
- SC2TOG = Single Crochet Decrease
- BO = Bobble Stitch
- PICOT = Ch 3, sl st into first chain
- ST = Stitch

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## Special Stitches

### Bobble Stitch (BO)

Yarn over, insert hook into stitch, pull up a loop, yarn over and pull through 2 loops.

Repeat this process 5 times in the same stitch.

Yarn over and pull through all loops on hook.

### Picot

Chain 3.

Insert hook into first chain made and complete a slip stitch.

Picot complete.

### Single Crochet Decrease (SC2TOG)

Insert hook into next stitch and pull up a loop.

Insert hook into following stitch and pull up another loop.

Yarn over and pull through all loops.

## Construction Overview

The scarf is worked in three sections:

1. Dragon Head
2. Dragon Body with Scales
3. Snowflake Pockets

The dragon head is worked first.

The body continues directly from the head.

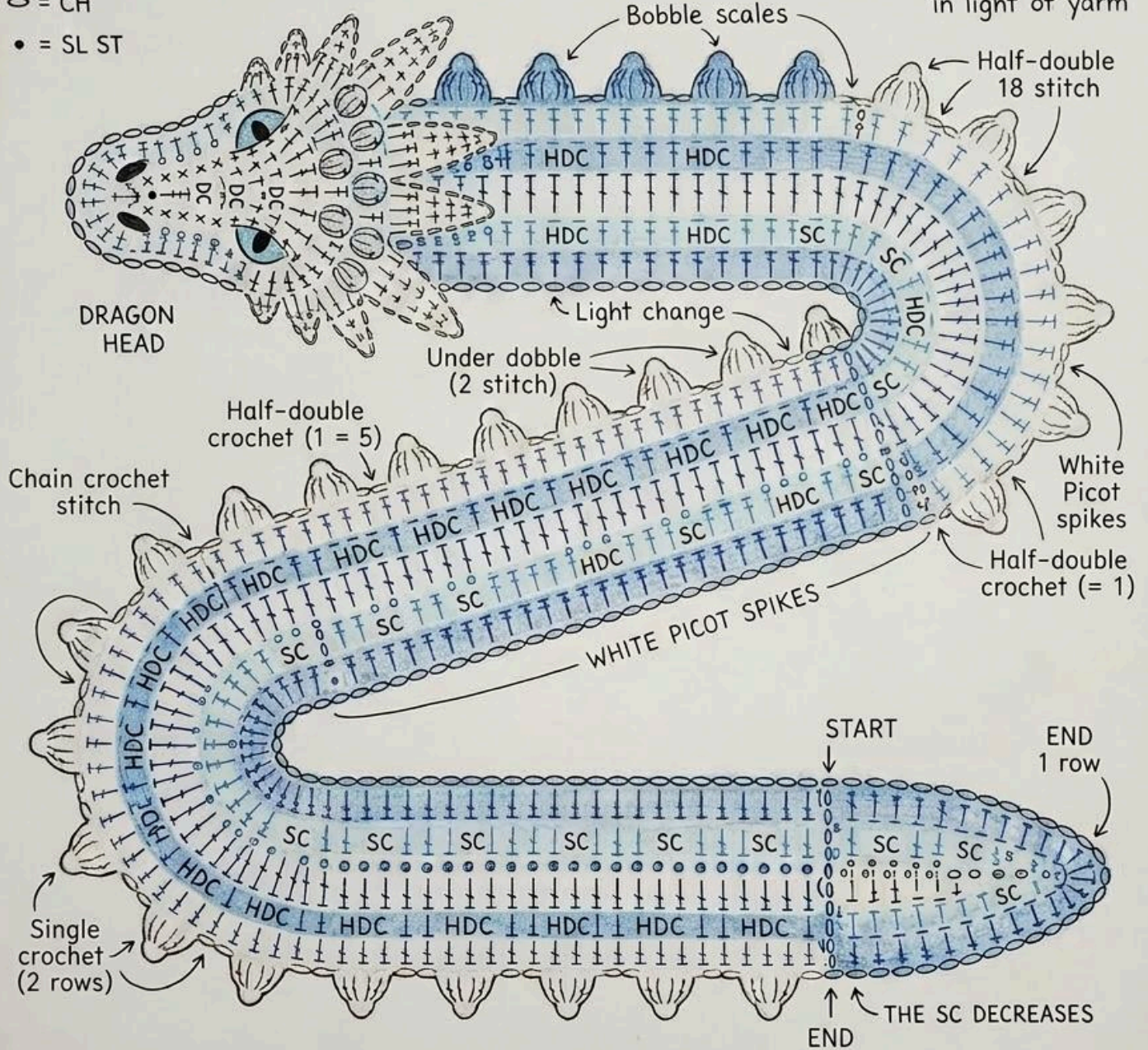
Snowflake pockets are made separately and attached at the end.

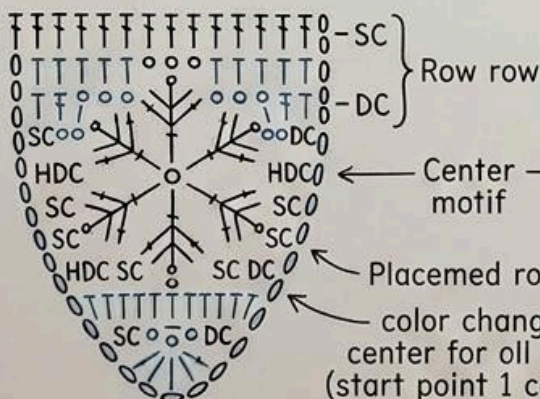
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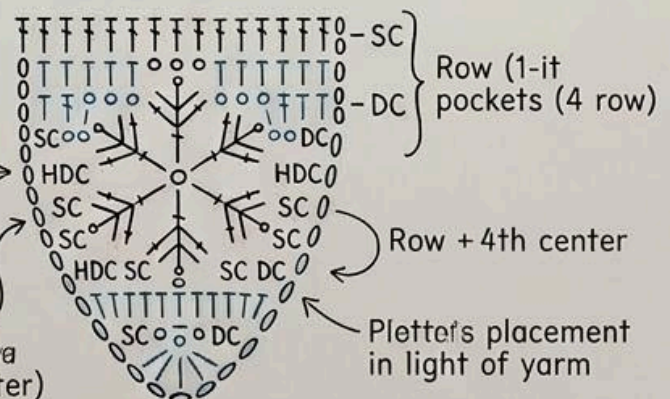

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## Dragon Head

### Foundation

CH 22.

Work around both sides of the foundation chain to create an oval shape.

SC in second CH from hook.

SC across.

Place 3 SC in final chain.

Continue around opposite side of foundation chain.

SC across.

Join with SL ST.

### Head Increase Rounds

Round 1:

CH 1.

Work SC evenly around.

Increase at both curved ends by placing 2 SC in selected stitches.

Join.

Round 2:

CH 1.

SC around.

Increase at nose and back of head.

Join.

Round 3:

Continue increasing to create the wider dragon head shape shown in the chart.

Maintain smooth curves.

Join.

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## Eye Placement

The chart shows two eye locations.

Position eyes symmetrically on each side of the head.

Either:

- Install safety eyes before closing
- Embroider with black yarn after completion

## Dragon Horns and Frills

### Side Frills

Attach yarn at one side of the head.

For each frill:

- CH 5
- DC back toward head
- HDC
- SC
- SL ST into head

Repeat around the side of the head to match the diagram.

Make progressively larger frills toward the center.

Mirror the same arrangement on the opposite side.

### Top Horns

Attach yarn at top center of head.

For each horn:

- CH 7
- DC in next 4 chains
- HDC
- SC
- Attach to head

Create multiple horns following the chart layout.

The center horns should be slightly taller than the outer horns.

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## Neck Transition

### Transition Row

After completing the head, begin working the scarf body.

CH 1.

Work evenly across the back of the head.

Shape gently until the width matches the body section shown in the chart.

The body should now be approximately 5–6 inches wide.

## Dragon Body

### Row 1

CH 1.

SC across.

Turn.

### Row 2

CH 1.

HDC across.

Turn.

### Row 3

CH 1.

HDC across.

Turn.

### Row 4

CH 1.

SC across.

Turn.

These rows establish the body texture.

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Continue following this sequence.

## Color Changes

The chart indicates subtle color transitions.

To create the Ice Dragon appearance:

### Suggested Sequence

- Rows 1–12: Ice Blue
- Rows 13–18: White
- Rows 19–30: Ice Blue
- Rows 31–36: White
- Rows 37–48: Ice Blue

Continue alternating as desired.

Always complete the final yarn-over of the last stitch with the new color.

This creates clean transitions.

## Bobble Scale Rows

The scales run along the upper edge of the scarf.

### Scale Placement Row

Work evenly across.

Place one Bobble Stitch every 6–8 stitches.

Example:

- HDC in 6 stitches
- BO in next stitch
- HDC in 6 stitches
- BO in next stitch

Continue across.

### Following Row

Work HDC across.

Crochet directly behind each bobble.

The bobbles will naturally pop forward.

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## **Repeat**

Create a scale row every 4–6 rows throughout the entire scarf.

This reproduces the dragon scales shown in the chart.

## **White Picot Spikes**

The chart shows decorative white spikes running along one edge.

Attach white yarn.

### **Spike Repeat**

SL ST into edge stitch.

CH 4.

PICOT.

CH 1.

SL ST into next edge stitch.

Skip 2 edge stitches.

Repeat across the entire length.

### **Large Corner Spikes**

At each curve:

CH 5.

PICOT.

CH 2.

SL ST into edge.

This produces larger dragon-style spikes.

## **First Curved Turn**

Continue body rows until approximately halfway through desired length.

The chart shows a dramatic curve.

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## Shaping

At beginning of row:

Work 2 HDC in first stitch.

At end of row:

Work 2 HDC in final stitch.

Continue this increase pattern for several rows.

The scarf will naturally curve.

Maintain scale placement along the outer curve.

## Middle Section

Continue straight rows after the curve.

Maintain:

- HDC texture
- Bobble scales
- Color transitions
- Picot spikes

This section forms the longest part of the scarf.

## Second Curved Turn

When approaching the opposite end:

Repeat the same shaping process used previously.

Increase gently on one side.

Maintain stitch consistency.

The body should curve naturally as shown in the chart.

## Tail Section

### Tail Decreases

Begin decreasing.

Work SC2TOG near both edges.

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Continue for several rows.

The width should gradually narrow.

## Final Tail Point

Continue decreasing until approximately 6–8 stitches remain.

Work:

- SC2TOG
- SC2TOG
- SC2TOG

Fasten off.

The tail should finish in a rounded point.

## Snowflake Pocket #1

Make 2 identical pockets.

### Foundation Ring

Magic Ring.

CH 1.

Work 12 SC into ring.

Join.

### Snowflake Center

Round 2:

Create six spokes:

- CH 5
- SL ST in next stitch

Repeat six times.

### Snowflake Arms

Following the chart:

Work combinations of:

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- SC
- HDC
- DC
- CH spaces

to form the snowflake branches.

Create six identical points.

## **Pocket Edge**

Once snowflake is complete:

Work around outer edge.

Shape into a pocket form.

Use:

- SC
- HDC
- DC

to create the rounded shield shape shown in the chart.

## **Pocket Opening**

Leave top edge open.

Work a straight row of DC across the top.

Fasten off.

## **Snowflake Pocket #2**

Repeat exactly as Pocket #1.

## **Attaching Pockets**

Position one pocket at each scarf end.

Align carefully.

Using matching yarn:

- Whip stitch
- Mattress stitch
- Slip stitch join

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Attach sides and bottom only.

Leave top open to create functional pockets.

## Final Edging

Attach white yarn.

Work one round of SC around all outer edges.

At every scale:

SL ST around base.

At every spike:

Work carefully to preserve shape.

Fasten off.

Weave in all ends.

## Finishing and Blocking

Lightly wet-block the scarf.

Shape:

- Dragon head
- Horns
- Frills
- Scales
- Picot spikes
- Snowflake pockets

Allow to dry completely.

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## Completed Ice Dragon Scarf 🐉❄️

Your finished scarf will feature:

- A sculpted dragon head
- Raised bobble scales along the back
- White picot spikes
- Soft ice-inspired color transitions
- Two decorative snowflake pockets
- A tapered dragon tail

The result is a dramatic fantasy scarf that closely follows the chart design while remaining practical and wearable.
